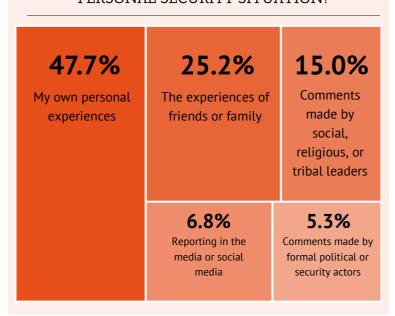

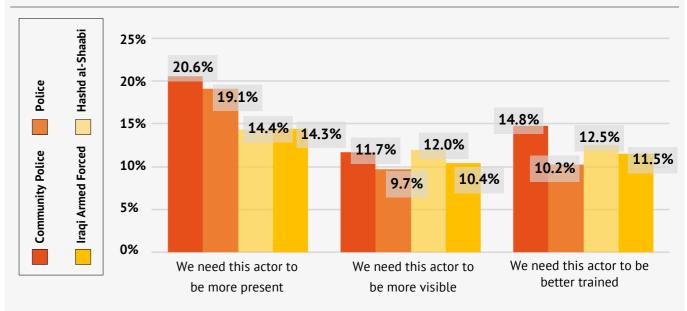

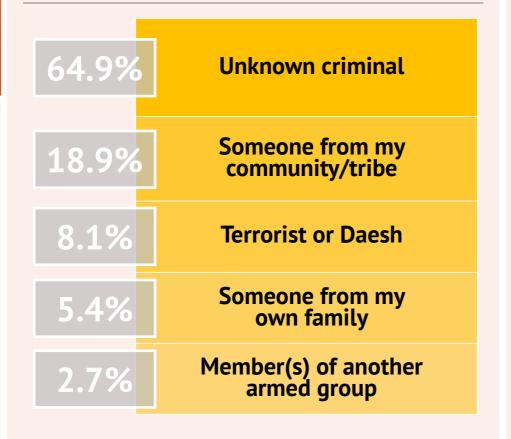

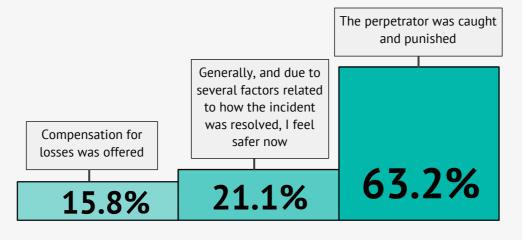

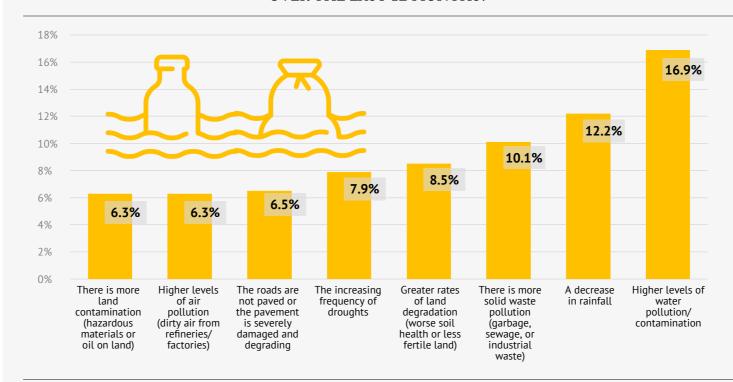

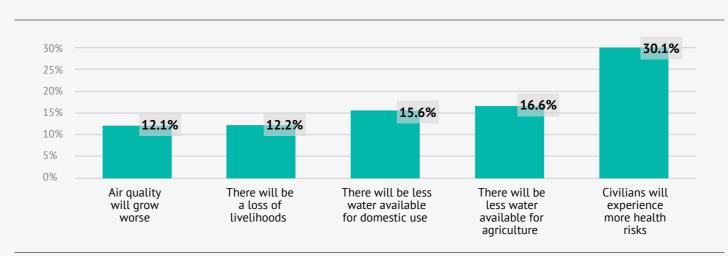

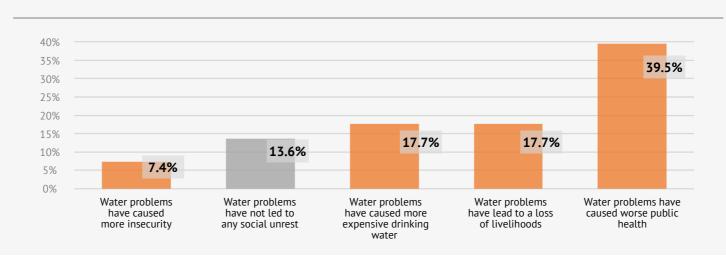

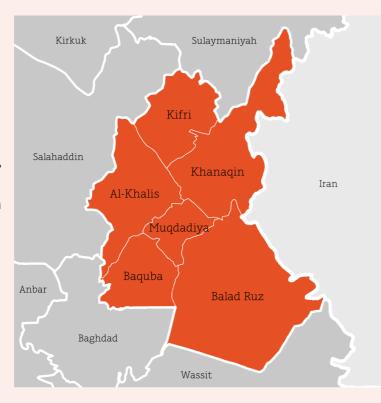
The Human Security Survey (HSS) is a methodology developed by PAX to collect data and facilitate dialogue about civilians' experiences in conflict situations. #### **HUMAN SECURITY SURVEY METHODOLOGY**

Over a period of 3 weeks in February 2025, **15** enumerators conducted **708** face-to-face interviews across all 7 districts of Diyala Governorate using a standardized survey script. For more details on how HSS data is collected and analysed, view our <u>methodological note</u>.

Taking into account the most recent population estimates, respondent targets were set with the aim of a representative distribution across gender, district, subdistrict, and urban/rural areas. Communities, households, and individual respondents were selected to participate through a systematic and approximately random procedure to increase the likelihood of generalizability.

The Wand Al-Khair organization, trusted long-time partner of PAX will continue its work in Diyala through **community engagement activities** with civilians, authorities, and a multitude of security actors to improve the local security situation using the results of the Human Security Survey.
